the word <u>look</u> ...that word is used of the angels looking as scripture...it means to stoop to a thing in order to look into it...to study intently...to inspect curiously... you see the angels can read which means the enemy of God and man...Satan and his demons...who were once angels...now fallen... can study intently also...

• So in his brilliant strategy God informs his angels and his people of what he is going to do...giving enough information to trust but conceals His exact strategies until his designated time to reveal them... All the characters revealed in the Christmas narrative...the birth of the promised Messiah are either heroes...Zechariah, Elizabeth, Mary, Joseph, the Shepherds, and one is mentioned is a Villian King Herod....but you know who is not mentioned hardly at all yet played a key role? The Boys of Bethelem...the slaughter of boys under the age of two, in Bethlehem and it surrounding area. But lets start with the part of the story of Christmas that we all like...

We love the story of the Maji visiting Jesus

2 Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the reign of King Herod. About that time some wise men from eastern lands arrived in Jerusalem, asking, ² "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star as it rose, and we have come to worship him."

- It was in Bethlehem, David's city, that the Jews expected great David's greatest Son to be born; it was there that they expected God's Anointed One to come into the world. So was in Bethlehem that Jesus was born.
- Bethlehem was quite a little town six miles to the south of Jerusalem. In the olden days it had been called Ephrath or Ephratah.
- It was in Bethlehem that Jacob had buried Rachel, and had set up a pillar of memory beside her grave .
- It was there that Ruth had lived when she married Boaz
- But above all Bethlehem was the home and the city of David; and it was for the water of the well of Bethlehem that David longed when he was a hunted fugitive upon the hills
- It stood high up on a grey limestone ridge more than two thousand five hundred feet in height. The ridge had a summit at each end, and a hollow like a saddle between them. So, from its position, Bethlehem looked like a town set in an amphitheatre of hills.
- the Magi were came representing a king from another land who could offer up these gifts and honor the new king, which is a custom among nations to keep the peace.
- Maji were the counselors and the teachers of the Babylon and later the Persian kings. In Persia no sacrifice could be offered unless one of the Magi was present. They were considered men of holiness and wisdom. In the book of

Daniel chapter two we get insight into what type of people make up the Maji...or King's councilors

- <u>Magicians</u>.....a psychic...one who receives information from spirits <u>Enchanters...</u>talks to the dead...a medium <u>Sorcerers</u>...one who practices witchcraft... one who possess occult knowledge... and practices magic arts ...one who cast spells uses potions... <u>Astrologers</u>...looks for guidance from the stars...also includes in those days astromoners...those who study the stars... <u>the kings looked to the gods the dead</u>, and the stars for <u>their guidance</u>.
- In those ancient days all pagans believed in astrology. They believed that they could foretell the future from the stars, and they believed that a man's destiny was settled by the star under which he was born. It is not difficult to see how that belief arose. The stars pursue their unvarying courses; they represent the order of the universe. If then there suddenly appeared some brilliant star, if the unvarying order of the heavens was broken by some special phenomenon, it did look as if God was breaking into his own order, and announcing some special thing.
- But to Heroed all he heard was a threat to his throne? someone else called the King of the Jews?

³ King Herod was deeply disturbed when he heard this, as was everyone in Jerusalem. ⁴ He called a meeting of the leading priests and teachers of religious law and asked, "Where is the Messiah supposed to be born?"

- When Herod was disturbed or feeling threatened...you bet everyone was disturbed, for it usually meant heads were going to role!
- Herod summoned the chief priests and the scribes. The scribes were the experts in scripture and in the law. The chief priests consisted of two kinds of people. They consisted of ex-high priests. They were the priestly nobility, and the members of these select families were called the chief priests. So Herod summoned and asked them where, according to the scriptures, the Anointed One of God should be born.
- They quoted the text in <u>Micah 5:2</u> to him.

⁵ "In Bethlehem in Judea," they said, "for this is what the prophet wrote: ⁶ 'And you, O Bethlehem in the land of Judah, are not least among the ruling cities of Judah, for a ruler will come from you who will be the shepherd for my people Israel." ⁷ Then Herod called for a private meeting with the wise men, and he learned from them the time when the star first appeared. ⁸ Then he told them, "Go to Bethlehem and search carefully for the child. And when you find him, come back and tell me so that I can go and worship him, too!"

- His plan was for the magi to lead him to the home of this young threat likely not more than a 18 months old.
- The magi heard the commands of Herod and were off with great excitement, because they now were less than a day's journey to their final destiny

⁹ After this interview the wise men went their way. And the star they had seen in the east guided them to Bethlehem. It went ahead of them and stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw the star, they were filled with joy! ¹¹ They entered the house and saw the child with his mother, Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasure chests and gave him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

- <u>Gold</u> has been long valued due to its beauty and resistance to corrosion It is a metal that does not tarnish. It has been used in jewelry and commerce for thousands of years. the appropriate gift for a king
- Frankincense and Myrrh are aromatic resins extracted from rare trees.
- <u>Frankincense</u> an almost white resin, was one of the most prized and costly substances in the ancient world, worth more than its weight in gold. It was used in medicines and incense..it was the epresents the intersessor Priestly office
- <u>Myrrh</u>, a dark resin, was widely used in perfumes, incense and embalming. his death they knew he would die..
- All of these substances were extremely expensive, usually reserved for royalty when all three were combined because only royalty could afford this kind of wealth.

- the Magi were sent representing a king from another land who could offer up these gifts and honor the new king,
- God intervenes on Herod's plan

¹² When it was time to leave, they returned to their own country by another route, for God had warned them in a dream not to return to Herod. ¹³ After the wise men were gone, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. "Get up! Flee to Egypt with the child and his mother," the angel said. "Stay there until I tell you to return, because Herod is going to search for the child to kill him." ¹⁴ That night Joseph left for Egypt with the child and Mary, his mother, ¹⁵ and they stayed there until Herod's death. This fulfilled what the Lord had spoken through the prophet: "I called my Son out of Egypt.

- So Joseph was warned in a dream to flee into Egypt to escape Herod's murderous intentions. The flight into Egypt was entirely natural. Often, throughout the troubled centuries before Jesus came, when some peril and some tyranny and some persecution made life intolerable for the Jews, they sought refuge in Egypt.
- The result was that every city in Egypt had its colony of Jews; and in the city of Alexandria there were actually more than a million Jews, and certain districts of the city were entirely handed over to them.
- Joseph in his hour of peril was doing what many a Jew had done before; and when Joseph and Mary reached Egypt they would not find themselves altogether amidst strangers, for in every town and city they would find Jews who had sought refuge there.
- That is a quotation from <u>Hosea 11:1</u>, which reads: "When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son".
- The costly part of the Christmas story... Jesus was safe but what about those the other little boys of Bethlehem...often considered the first martyrs... and their families? could not the angel warn them also?....
- but he did not... Evil visited Bethlehem that night. 30-60 toddlers and infants lost their lives that day...Nothing would ever be the same for their families.

¹⁶ Herod was furious when he realized that the wise men had outwitted him. He sent soldiers to kill all the boys in and around Bethlehem who were two years

old and under, based on the wise men's report of the star's first appearance. ¹⁷ Herod's brutal action fulfilled what God had spoken through the prophet Jeremiah: ¹⁸ "<u>A cry was heard in Ramah—weeping and great mourning.</u> <u>Rachel weeps for her children, refusing to be comforted, for they are dead."</u>

• Their tears were those of mothers who would not be comforted. They are like the tears of Rachel..

Matthew quotes <u>Jeremiah 31:15</u>, "¹⁵ This is what the LORD says: "A cry is heard in Ramah— deep anguish and bitter weeping. Rachel weeps for her children, refusing to be comforted— for her children are gone."

- The picture in Jeremiah was this. Ramah or Bethlehem was wher Jacob had buried Rachel, and had set up a pillar of memory beside her grave Jeremiah was picturing the people of Jerusalem being led away in exile. In their sad way to an alien land they pass Ramah, and Ramah was the place where Rachel lay buried (<u>1 Samuel 10:2</u>); and Jeremiah pictures Rachel weeping, even in the tomb, for the fate that had befallen the people. and now mourning the boys of Bethlehem...

²¹ So Joseph got up and returned to the land of Israel with Jesus and his mother. ²² But when he learned that the new ruler of Judea was Herod's son Archelaus, he was afraid to go there. Then, after being warned in a dream, he left for the region of Galilee. ²³ So the family went and lived in a town called Nazareth. This fulfilled what the prophets had said: "He will be called a Nazarene.

And so was fulfilled what the Lord had said through the prophet: "Out of Egypt I called my son." ¹⁶ When Herod realized that he had been outwitted by the Magi, he was furious, and he gave orders to kill all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity who were two years old and under, in accordance with the time he had learned from the Magi.

This has been calculated by math experts to mean...that including the difference in time zones, Santa has 31 hours to deliver all the gifts worldwide... This means that he would have to visit 832 residences each second! Not including the time it would take to eat cookies and drink the milk that many, many of these home will have set out for Him...talk about eating and running...

This is a great supernatural fantasy...The mixing of the supernatural and the natural... and all one has to be is kind of good to receive gifts!!...the lesson is be good and life hands you good things.....the whole story of Santa is an imaginative creative supernatural, fake...

which leads to the real story of Christmas which is God's idea..... This story is also a creative, imaginative, supernatural story...the story of God becoming man ...but it is realwhat is the difference between Santa and Jesus ...

Well, God's supernatural work doesn't come nicely packaged and presented to us as a gift we simply have to unwrap...

God's supernatural gifts come wrapped in the common, they come wrapped in insurmountable problems and obstacles, failures and loss.....problems we want to be running away from...not waiting around to joyfully receive and unwrap in the morning...

God's shipping methods often look and sometimes feel like this...roll video...

After video....and like this video...they always get delivered on time...to their destination...and with a purpose...though the route will be full of bumps and troubles...assents and descents...the package will arrive!!

What amazes me is that God did not exempt his own son from this spiritual principle...

The God of Heaven would be priority shipped to the earth...in accordance with his general plan of calling and using the least of us...The birth of Jesus falls right into line with the stated principles of God's strategy in carrying out his will....

^{Luke 1:26} In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, ²⁷ to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you." ²⁹ Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be.

• She is stressing...heart racing, adrenaline pumping...fear stricken.....he must have the wrong house and wrong person...

- Nobody has ever talked to me like that...and I am highly favored by God??...uh look around? and He is with me??
- Your words do not line up with my reality? it does not fell like that?
- So how does God favor me??? no power or position or pedigree I am a peasant Jewish teenager... living in the wrong town... Nazareth...*FAR FROM THE RELIGIOUS CENTER*...a small blue collar town...in Galilee which was looked down by the religious...non kosher and way to many gentiles...
- and the Messiah is supposed to come from Bethlehem any way.

^{LK 1: 30} But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favor with God. ³¹ You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. ³¹ You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. ³² He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, ³³ and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end."

³⁴ "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?"

- FIRST OFF...WRONG SHIPPING ADDRESS...How can he possibly be great? I am a nobody
- Secondly..How can I be pregant and still be a virgin...impossible..
- And you know it will be a boy...whose name means God Saves! which will by the way be his call..

Luke 1:35 The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. ³⁶ Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month. ³⁷ For no word from God will ever fail."

³⁸ "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." Then the angel left her.

- Great step of faith...Ok God I trust your word!! the supernatural will interact with the natural...
- and by the way how is she highly favored?...There is no greater favor than God taking his Humanity from her DNA...
- Mary's pregnancy would be a miracle.....His God DNA would be combined with His Human DNA...thus fully God and Fully man

I wonder how good looking she was...for Isaiah says of Jesus

Isaiah 53 :2....He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.

- He would carry no godly splendor!! no riches or glamour would draw people to him!!
- Even his looks were at best plain!! that he would not be considered desirable!!

The Lord has sent the gift in priority shipping...the enemy is none the wiser...nor any idea how the gift is being sent...

God didn't just choose a WOMAN, He chose a COUPLE, both godly and willing to make a great sacrifice. <u>Now to Joseph</u>...

^{MT 1: 18} This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. ¹⁹ Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly.

- These two verses do not begin to address the emotional devastation, relational conflict and inner conflict that Joseph and Mary would experience in the explanation Mary would give to Joseph upon her return after three months away visiting Elisabeth.
- at this time Mary who would have been pledged and considered legally married to Joseph though not officially wed ...was pregnant...and not by him

The three stages to Marriage... of which she was in the second...

- In those times an **engagement** was often made when the couple were only children...It was usually made by the parents or a professional match maker...
- Marriage was considered far to important to be left to the dictates of the human heart...immaturity or lack of judgment
- The Pledge or betrothal...was when the ratification of the engagement became official...the girl could call it off...but at this time they were considered in a legally binding marriage...although they would not be wed for one year...the year was spent in preparing for the marriage...home etc. but no living together or marital relations were allowed
- During this time a man and woman would be considered a husband and wife
- To break the pledge would be require an official divorce...
- The third stage was the "Marriage proper" which took place at the end of the year of betrothal or pledge

needless to say...

- Joseph would be highly stressed by the timing and circumstances of this event...
- We are not given a time line...his wrestling with this situation could have taken days, weeks or evens month's
- And he would have to make some choices...

- 1. one of which would be to believe what Mary certainly would have told him happened...which was probably dismissed outright
- 2. It obviously appears that he did not believe her... which would make her in his mind a not only an adulterer but a liar also...
- 3. And being a good man his only option was to do the right thing in this circumstance...he could disgrace her...in many ways...or he could exit quietly..
- 4. He chose quietly. To move on... to pick up the pieces of his life...
- <u>NowWe can only imagine the stress Mary was under....adultery was an offense</u> which could be punishable by death...
- Saying yes to God is sure paying off...the gift is in smooth transit...

It is one thing to say yes to God ... it is another to stay yes when it all goes sideways...

- Will we say yes when it all goes sideways? Was Mary's yes to God request as strong now as it was earlier? Now that it appears her choice to follow God is costing her greatly...
- <u>It is pretty easy to follow God when his will and our will line up...it is a whole other story</u> when his leading takes us into the lions den... or the furnace fire...

But this is where character is displayed...

- 1. Joseph was Righteous...righteousness is often seen as not doing something wrong... like make sure you run away from sin...but in fact righteousness is dong something right...
- 2. righteousness is not just running away from sin... righteousness is chasing after that which is the right thing to do in a particular challenge...

<u>Righteousness is first of all...</u>

- Considerate ...which means he was thoughtful....he would consider what would be the right thing to do... (Matthew 1:19,20).
- <u>So the first thing he did was to do nothing. The moral for us: when you have to make a difficult decision, don't be in a hurry: more mistakes are made by haste than by delay.</u>
- He would consider...that he and Mary both lived in the same town. They were brought up in the same community. They both lived in Nazareth...they had family and friends...what was the bigger picture here...
- He thought that Mary had always told the truth their relationship was honest open and truthful...
- Her previous character had always been blameless. But now her story seemed unreal and strange. What happened...and her story must have stuck in his soul.
- The accepted normal thing to do would have been to expose her and make her a public disgrace. And Joseph considered doing that very thing, but his love and his compassion for Mary would not permit that kind of severe treatment.

- Clearly, Joseph's faithfulness and love to Mary led him to protect her life, even if she had betrayed him. I am sure he also thought about the child she was carrying and it's future...
- He needed to think this through....He thought before he acted...
- That is always the right thing to do...

<u>Second...Being Righteous</u> ...he would take into consideration what the righteous one...God would have him do..

- He was humble...willing to give God the final say.....
- Humility means we do not condemn...Joseph knew all are fallible...
 - He was humble...he did not condemn Mary even when he perceived he was deeply wronged...
- So Joseph decides to quietly...not gossip, not playing the victim card seeking sympathy,...he will simply release her from her vow.
- With the decision probably came a deep restful sleep...

But God intervened...

^{MT 1:20} But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit.²¹ She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." ^{MT 1:22} All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: ²³ "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" --which means, "God with us."

• Well that was the end of that nights sleep...

Here is a very, very important choice that Joseph and we will have to make at times in our lives... And that choice is this...

- Trading the good plan for the God plan...<u>there is a time to be prudent but there is also a</u> <u>time to be valiant...</u>
- Joseph had chosen to take the high road the prudent decision...to do the right thing... even the godly thing...
- Prudent people focus on avoiding problems...Valiant on what is right...
- Though emotionally devastated ... Joseph would come out smelling like a rose...
- It was risk free and failure proof... He could move on and she could never hurt him again...it would be hard but he could start over again...it was the good and right thing to do....
- Then God comes along and offers him the challenge to experience the GREAT THING.... By doing the valiant thing...
- But valiant people focus on Opportunities
- what I like about Mary and Joseph....<u>they were not educated beyond their obedience</u>
- what could be better or harder than to parent the Son of God...

- that is the crazy thing about serving God...there is nothing better and there is nothing harder
- God has always been comfortable with making people uncomfortable the way he packages and ships his gifts!!
- Mary would carry the social stigma of being morally suspect
- they were just one risk away from breaking through a barrier that seemed impossible.
- Satan would not be attracted to nor look for Jesus

But the God's way is always the risky ... it could fail... if it were not God

- It is always more fearful...people will criticize him ...he will appear weak...it could fail...it is not the logical choice...certainly seems like the harder road...
- How do you explain to people ... it's all good...I am marrying her because she is carrying the Messiah...
- After a while you probably just shut up...

<u>There is no such thing as risk free faith.</u> And you can't experience success without risking <u>failure.</u>

But on the flip side...this could be the opportunity of his life...

- Step father of the Messiah...
- And The ushering in of the kingdom of God...God with us and His name would be Jesus!!!

The choice: play it good and safe...or experience something great...

So Joseph grabbed on to God's plan and let go of His...and he never regretted it!!

• but a dream is one thing...reality is another...

Joseph took Mary Home... that is supernatural...they continued their engagement..

^{MT 1:24} When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. ²⁵ But he had no union with her until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

• It is not how much you now but how much you will act upon what you know...that makes the difference... it is your obedience to what you know...

<u>The couple are in place it is all down hill from here!</u> Well not exactly!!!! but the gift has not arrived yet...the destination of the christmas gift is Bethlehem...God has to priority ship them there...

Luke 2 :1 In those days Caesar Augustus issued a decree that a census should be taken of the entire Roman world. ² (This was the first census that took place while Quirinius was governor of

Syria.) ³ And everyone went to their own town to register. ⁴ So Joseph also went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem the town of David, because he belonged to the house and line of David. ⁵ He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to him and was expecting a child.

What? how messy is that...traveling while eight plus months pregnant over 60 miles of rough terrain ...probably on a donkey... pulling or carrying their luggage

- no phoning ahead for a hotel...the town crowded....Mary extremely uncomfortable and exhausted about to give birth...she is carrying God...
- ...Joseph tired and Frustrated...these are the two highly favorer ...where is the help here?
- and the best accommodations they will find are in a stable or cave...for the animals... Everything going well in the sight of God!

But they will arrive!! That is the way with God !! the destination is assured!! want to bring up Jackie...who has been on an eight year journey...to receive custody of her own precious package...her son!! she will tell us about it!!

you may be here today thinking how much longer God? will I ever get to where I am supposed to be?? will I ever become what you want me to be?? listen God's plan for you is in priority shipping...it is on the way...and has been...though the road is bumpy, long and tiresome...the destination is sure...

your job is to keep on obeying...to keep on going...and know that you are favored of God...

listen thrity years later Jesus went back to Nazareth, to the synagogue he grew up in...and was not ready to start his ministry... listen

^{Luke 16} He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, ¹⁷ and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written:

¹⁸ "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free,
¹⁹ to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." That proclamation is still in effect today! The Lord's favor is on you!! when in doubt on the journey always trust his favor on you!! though you may not get understand the ways of God trust the heart of God!!

aaaaa

In our culture Christmas means mistletoe, parties, carols, eggnog, big meals, a decorated tree, and last-minute shopping, the giving and receiving of gifts. While I would venture to say that these things are not objectionable in themselves, none of them (with the exception of giving gifts) has anything to do with the circumstances surrounding the birth of Christ.

It is easy to decry the commercialization of Christmas and to bemoan the Christmas parties that cater more to drunkenness than to anything relating to the birth of Jesus. But as off target as those things are, we who are Christians ought to enjoy this season of the year. It would be a double shame if we allowed the world to take this holiday (a word that really means "Holy Day") away from us. How should we celebrate this great day? The first and most obvious answer is this. You should celebrate Christmas by believing in Jesus. After all, this is why He came to the earth from heaven. He was born to be a Savior. And until you can call him "my Savior," you will never fully understand what Christmas is all about. Celebrating the birth of Jesus without receiving the gift of Jesus...is quite odd!! yet so common!!

Christmas is about God doing what he said he would do... what Every book, every chapter, every page of the Old Testament testified to...This one great truth—"He's coming." That's the whole theme of the Old Testament—that God would one day send the Messiah to the earth to deliver his people Israel.

Noah said He's coming....Moses said, "He's coming." David said, "He's coming." Isaiah said, "He's coming." Jeremiah said, "He's coming." Daniel said, "He's coming." Micah said, "He's coming." Zechariah said, "He's coming." Malachi said, "He's coming." And when Jesus finally arrived, they didn't believe it. In fact John the Apostle writes

John 1:¹⁰ He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. ¹¹ He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him.

- When he entered the world... The world did not recognize him... and his own missed him...
- in fact "that which was his own." easily translate as "his own home."
- He came to his own home—the Holy Land, and to his own people—the nation of Israel, and they did not receive him.
- Jesus came "home" to his own people—and they wouldn't take him in.
- They should have known better. They knew he was coming from the earliest scriptures...—God had told them over and over again many times in many ways. They had ample warning. And when Jesus finally arrived, they didn't believe he was the gift!!.
- they were to receive him into their home... and introduce him to the nations of the world!! introduce the world to its savior...
- But the news is not entirely bad. While it is true that the world ignored him and his own people rejected him—not everyone ignored him and not everyone rejected him.
- Some people recognized him and welcomed him as Lord and Savior. It is useful to recall that all the apostles and 100% of the earliest disciples were Jewish.
- Even in the midst of general rejection, many followed the Lord.
- John 1:12-13 offers a very simple description of what it means to become a

Christian. Here is that simple gospel, by which the most uninformed may be saved."

^{John 1:12} Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God—¹³ children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

• Verse 12 has been rightly seen as one of the greatest verses in all of the New Testament for it tells us how to be saved.

A Simple Step—ReceivingThe way of salvation begins with a simple step: "To all who received him."

- The word "receive" means to welcome a visitor into your home. It's what happens when someone knocks at your door and you open the door and invite them to come in.
- To "receive" Christ means to welcome him as an honored guest and to have him make you his home.

A Wonderful Result—Child of God

- "He gave the right to become children of God." The word "right" means "honor" or "privilege."
- The moment you receive Christ into your life, God gives you the honor of becoming a member of his family.
- God only gives the privilege of being his children to those who by personal faith receive Jesus as the God who became flesh to save us...

Verse 13 explains how this takes place... we become God's children. There are three "nots" and one "but"—and all four are important.

A. Not of natural descent. You aren't a Christian just because your parents were Christians And you won't get brownie points with God just because you come from a good family and have a fine education. ... Your family background doesn't count when it comes to salvation.

B. Nor of human decision. Literally this reads "not of the will," meaning there is nothing you can do to save yourself—so don't bother trying.

C. Or of a husband's will. Literally it is "not of the will of a man," meaning pedigree... No man is big enough to swing open the pearly gates on your behalf.

D. But born of God. Here is the heart of the gospel. Salvation is of the Lord. It's a free gift—totally free and totally of grace. you receive it!! It's not a cooperative venture where you do your part and God does his.

But someone may object, "Don't I have a part to play in salvation?" Sure you have a part. Your part is to be hopelessly lost in sin and God's part is to save you. That way God alone gets the credit. Salvation is a work of God from first to last.
